Founded in 2010, the Community Coalition Against Human Trafficking (CCAHT) serves all 33 counties of East Tennessee to end human trafficking through prevention and intervention as well as trauma-informed, comprehensive aftercare services to survivors. Through our direct services program, Grow Free TN, we offer a variety of care to those impacted by human trafficking. All of our services are free, individualized, and all-inclusive.

CCAHT serves as the single point-of-contact for all human trafficking reports in the East Tennessee. As a partner of the Tennessee Counter-Trafficking Alliance (TCTA), we are dedicated to providing holistic, wrap-around care to both adult and youth survivors. - 7,349 unique services provided to adult survivors
- **2,153** total nights of safety between Emergency Receiving Center and Phoenix House
 - 93 individuals served through the As You Are program a collaboration with the Tennessee Department of Corrections

- **2,667** unique services provided to youth survivors
- youth engaged in prevention activities using evidence-based psychoeducation curricula hosted in partnership with other youth-serving organizations



Grow Free TN is the first counter-trafficking agency (globally!) to have staff trained in the "Caring Dads" curriculum - an evidence-based program that works with fathers/father figures to promote the safety and well-being of children and their mothers to prevent violence and the risk of human trafficking.

2,706 individuals trained **76** total training events


Launched a new strategic collaboration with a local animal shelter. Individuals fleeing trafficking situations now have a safe place for their pets while they are receiving care.

Partnered with the International Center for Missing & Exploited Children to participate as part of pilot project for screening trafficking of children under the age of 13. Currently, there is no other standardized, age-appropriate means for screening children this young.

*Reports and served are tracked separately. Not all reports to GFTN receive services due to factors like survivor preference or screening/eligibility.






SERVICE PROVISION:

In 2023, we received reports in **30** out of the **33** counties in east Tennessee. Higher reports of human trafficking reflect the awareness and availability of services for survivors, which then disrupts the crime of human trafficking from going unseen.

REMINDERS OF Hope

Justine* is a 36 year old female that was referred to Grow Free TN (GFTN) by a local medical provider. Justine had been trafficked for over 5 years by her partner, who took advantage of her vulnerabilities. Justine had a lifelong physical disability and struggled with addiction. She was estranged from her family and any type of support system. After promising to take care of her, her partner instead forced her to engage in sexual acts with others in order to fuel his addiction and provide for their basic needs.

Justine enrolled in CCAHT's Phoenix House transitional housing program, where she prioritized health and healing from both her trafficking trauma and her physical health needs. Justine spent several months at Phoenix House, where she received shelter, intensive case management, and therapy before she experienced relapse and decided to exit the program. Seven months later, Justine reached out to the GFTN hotline and reported she was ready to try again. Justine was welcomed back to the GFTN Emergency Receiving Center and again began working with her Care Coordinator to determine her preferred recovery path. Due to the close proximity of her trafficker, Justine ultimately determined that Knoxville was not a safe place for her to have the fresh start that she needed. Justine worked with her GFTN support team to secure a placement with a partner agency where she would have the opportunity to access crucial supports and a path toward healing.

Justine keeps in touch with her GFTN family and reports that she is thriving. Over the past year, she has begun repairing relationships with her family. She has taken critical steps toward improving her physical health and learning to manage her disability. She is 9 months sober and working toward her certification as a peer recovery specialist—the first step in achieving her dream of helping others experiencing addiction and being a healthy resource for other survivors of human trafficking. Justine credits the relentless support and unconditional love she received from her GFTN team, alongside access to resources and advocacy, as the foundation of this next phase of her life.

October 24, 2023





REMINDERS OF Hope

By the time she met her trafficker at age 16, Abby's* childhood was already marked by repeated trauma and household instability. Abby began using drugs and often ran away from home in an attempt to cope with the effects of her childhood experiences. While on the run, she was befriended by the man who would become her trafficker, using her addiction to force her to engage in commercial sex acts for his gain. He even went as far as branding her with a tattoo that marked her as "his".

Abby was referred to Grow Free TN (GFTN) in June 2023 by the Department of Children's Services in order to continue working on the effects of her trauma as she transitioned from a residential treatment facility. Abby was enrolled in therapy and care coordination with the GFTN support team, stating that she hoped to improve communication skills and boost her self-confidence. Abby worked diligently toward her goals. She obtained a full-time job while earning her GED. Despite her hard work and progress, Abby's self-confidence was compromised by the tattoo that served as a constant reminder of what she had been through, even making her anxious to be in public where she might be recognized for this marking. In December 2023, GFTN was able to coordinate with a local tattoo artist for a complete tattoo cover-up, replacing the visual reminder of her trafficking experience with a symbol of her resiliency and healing.

Abby states that her work with GFTN has given her the self-confidence to feel comfortable going out in public and living her life again. She reports she feels more stable in her support system and healthy relationships. She was excited to earn her driver's license and was even able to save up and buy herself a car.
